Professor Steve McCarty

Steve McCarty is Professor of English at Osaka Jogakuin College in Japan. Since 1983 he has been active in the Japan Association for Language Teaching, including the highest appointed office representing all research groups. In 1998 he was elected President of the World Association for Online Education (WAOE). His keynote paper discusses the relationship between Web 2.0 technologies, podcasting and mobile learning.



Professor Michael Vallance

Dr. Michael Vallance Ph.D. is Associate Professor at Future University in Hokkaido, Japan. His doctoral research from the University of Durham was on the impact of inter networked teacher training in ICT integration. His keynote presentation begins with a summary of the transformational potential of ICT, presents an overview of current practice utilizing iPods in education, and focuses on his research on the use of iWriter for a student writing project.



Michael Coghlan

Michael Coghlan is recognized internationally as an expert in the implementation of synchronous learning environments. He is a specialist in synchronous facilitation and the use of online voice technologies with NetSpot Pty Ltd and was part of the Australian Flexible Learning Framework's Beyond Text 2005 New Practices research team. He has been e-learning coordinator with TAFE South Australia. Michael is a co-founder of the Webheads community for like-minded ESL/EFL students and teachers.
